Rich Saitz, MD, MPH, Boston University Professor of Medicine (General Internal Medicine) and School of Public Health Professor & Chair of Community Health Sciences since 2014, passed away in January from pancreatic cancer. He was 58. Rich had an international reputation in both alcohol and drug addiction research.
